## HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

The Commercial Course, newly established, is proving the most popular with the students, fully one-third of whom are enrolled in the complete course and others for some parts of it.

The annual reception for the teachers' will be held in the High School auditorium at 8:00 o'clock next Friday evening. This is the opportunity offered for all the towns people to become acquainted with the teachers several of whom are new this year and to establish those bonds of cooperation and understanding between patrons and teachers without which a school cannot reach its highest ideals.

Frank Cockerline and daughter Mildred have moved to Porland.


A baby girl was born to Mr. and Mrs. William Hicinbotham on Wednesday the 4th, at the Oregon City Hospital.
