peace, men who are taken out of active fighting and left resting on their arms and engaged in reconstruction work need more than ever that touch of home given by the Welfare organizations: We all owe the boys this greatest Christmas gift.

In all probability school will begin again next Monday, after an enforced vacation of over three weeks. 
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
