The United War Work Drive Goes Over the Top

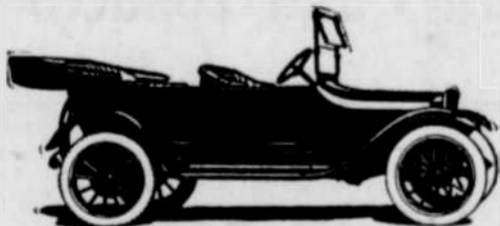
