**West Point Examinations**

Competitive examinations for appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point will be held at the University of Oregon Monday, February 3d, 1919 beginning at 9 o'clock. These examinations will be open to all qualified young men who are residents of the First Congressional District of Oregon.

Candidates must be between 17 and 22 years of age at the time they enter the academy, must be not less than five feet four inches in height, and physically fit for military service. Candidates will be examined at the University both for physical fitness and mental preparation. The subjects covered in the mental examination are history, algebra, geography, geometry and English grammar, composition and literature.
