### Tapping the Loop

The proposal to tap the Mount Hood loop road by constructing a highway from the vicinity of Firwood, through the George and Estacada districts and down Eagle Creek and the Clackamas river to connect with the Pacific Highway at Oregon City is worthy of commendation.

This project is one that should have the backing of Oregon City road enthusiasts and business men to the limit. Such a road offers not only wonderful scenic advantages, but would be a real market road, and would bring to Oregon City thousands of dollars in business that now is diverted into Portland by reason of the superior roads in that direction.

Let us approach this project in a sane spirit, and remember that this is no piker's idea, for the cost of construction will run into big figures. It is the fond hope of the promoters that aid may be obtained from the government, through post road funds, from the state, from the county and from the road districts through which the highway will pass.

The Mt. Hood loop road proper will be financed by federal government, the state highway commission, and possibly the counties of Hood River and Clackamas, through which the loop highway will run, and by Multnomah county, which was authorized by the 1919 session of the legislature to expend some of its money on highways situated in counties adjacent and contiguous to it.

Eastern Clackamas people and residents of Oregon City have formed an organization for the purpose of securing this Clackamas river highway, and if the difference of opinion that may arise over the exact location of the road does not spoil the project at its inception, we may reasonably foresee the completion, within a few years, of a main artery east and west through Clackamas county.

Oregon City should bend all its energies to bring its country neighbors closer to the county seat, and should embrace an opportunity to assist a movement the success of which will probably kill the county division bogey.—Oregon City Enterprise.
