The Crown Willamette and Hawley Pulp and Paper companies announce general increase of 3 cents per hour in wages of employes to go into effect July 1st. This is an addition of \$120,000 per year to the payroll and Oregon City will have one from paper mills and Woolen mills, after July 1st, of \$3,000,000 per year.

THE LARGER FOURTH

BERRIES

There should be only one question with you, and that is, "Does it pay?" or "Is there a paying market for the fruits we grow?"

Would \$200 or \$300 an acre net profit interest you? Does it seem fabulous to say that one of your neighbors received \$535.00 from a trifle over one acre of Loganberries, last season, netting him over \$400. Would you care to talk with him?

Would you accept a proposition whereby you plant 10 acres to berries, and after the second year, receive \$1,000 for the crop, without bothering about picking or berry crates, or \$1,000 net for the next five to ten years? You would simply have to cultivate the ground and give proper care to the canes.

Just such propositions will be offered you this fall by the Cannery at Estacada. Plan your acreage now and think it over.

There will be a meeting at one of the berry ranches some time this month, the date to be announced later, for the benefit of those who are interested in making larger returns on their farms. Some of your friends will tell you a few interesting facts at this meeting.
