Canada Thistles

Oregon City, Ore., July 8, 1919. O. L. Stranghan, Estacada, Oregon.

Dear Sir: - The time of year has arrived when it is necessary to keep close watch on the various patches of Canada Thistles in the county to see that they are not allowed to go to seed. At a recent conference with the County Court and the District Attorney it was decided to carry out the provisions of the law which provide a fine of not less than \$25.00 for allowing the Canada Thistle to go to seed. It is necessary in order to obtain convictions under the law that the owner or tenant of the land so infested shall have knowledge of the fact that the thistles are on his land. Accordingly, if you will send me a list of all the owners of land on which Canada Thistle is growing, which you know about, being careful to give the name and address of either the owner or the tenant and as near as possible the location of the thistles, I will write each man a letter, notifying him to keep the thistles cut down. Following this, I count on you to advise me if any of the thistles are allowed to bloom. It will be well to have several witnesses to this fact. In that event I will have the District Attorney bring an action at law to collect the fine.

In all probability it will not be necessary to involve the law when the owners of the thistles are warned beforehand, but in case any man allows them to go to seed, it is planned to make an example of him. This work has been endorsed by the Farm Bureau. The Canada Thistle must not be allowed to go to seed.
