Community Cooperation

Last February a Farmers' Week was held at Cornell University, N. Y., at which the opening address was given by the Dean of the New York State College of Agriculture, A. R. Mann. The subject was "Social Responsibilities of the Rural Community." A copy has just been received and read with profound interest and appreciation. We give here some extracts which have a bearing on the Community Commercial Club just organized for this vicinity, and are in a line with what we have been trying to inculcate.

"There is in every community a vast impulse for personal and community development which is allowed to evaporate because of the lack of an organized means of existence."

The above thus states most clearly the purpose and meaning of an organization like the Eastern Clackamas Community Club.

Again: "When I was in South Carolina a few years ago attending the National Corn Exposition, I saw a lot of Indians wearing large badges with the words, 'Rock Hill is a Good Town,' 'Rock Hill is a Good Town.' That idea of pride in one's own town, one's own farm and community is a great national asset. If we could all say, wherever we are, we shall help to make this a good town, or a good farming community, and then go to work with a keen sense of our public responsibility, the business of making communities would soon be well underway. It is our common task. Fellow-service is the highest service. The sociologists tell us that we are gradually passing out of the conflict and competitive stage of life into the cooperative. The spirit of working together is upon us. It is fundamental. We live not in spite of one another but because of one another. The duty of each of us to promote the common welfare, to discharge our obligation to the community, is as real and unchanging as the fact of life itself."

The Ford Libel Suit

We have been offered free plate matter containing the record of Henry Ford's libel suit against the Chicago Tribune. But we cannot see any good will be served by accepting the offer. Mr. Ford might better have ignored what was said of him by the paper, remembering it was expressed during the heat of the war, when men thought keenly and expressed themselves strongly. It will soon be all forgotten, even his attempt "to get the boys out of the trenches by Christmas." We commend to Mr. Ford the old maxim, "let the cobbler stick to his last." Let him stick to manufacturing Fords, Fordsons and trucks and not meddle with libel suits unless they may prove good advertising agencies.
