

State Teachers' Association

Final arrangements for the State Teachers' Association, which is to meet in Portland, December 29:30-31, have been made by President A. C. Hampton and the complete program for the three days' session has been prepared.

Of special interest to county school superintendents, rural teachers and club workers, will be the address of Professor O. J. Kern, who made a national reputation in rural school work as county superintendent of Winnebago County, Illinois, and who now holds a professorship in the University of California. The business of the session will be transacted by the Representative Council, which will te in session all day Monday, Dec. 29. Important reports to con e before this council are on retirement fund, salaries, state millage tax, promotion of thrift, health program, county unit, national legislation, local legislation. Tuesday morning, Dec. 30, teachers will all meet in general assembly. Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning will be devoted to department work and the convention will close with a general assembly Wednesday afternoon. Great interest is being shown by teachers in all parts of Oregon, and it is estimated that not less than three thousand teachers will be in attendance at these sessions.
