EAGLE TO SCREAM AT ESTACADA

At the meeting of the Community Club at the Hotel Estacada Friday evening, J. K. Ely, Mrs. S. E. Wooster, Mrs. H. C. Stevens, Mrs. R. G. McCall, Sylvester Lawrence, and F. E. Burns were appointed as a committee to arrange for a 4th of July celebration at Estacada.

The Committee met Monday afternoon at the office of S. E. Wooster and decided upon the following:

1. A parade to consist of decorated autos with such comic features and stunts as the public may furnish.
2. A Goddess of Liberty to be selected by vote for the most popular young lady. Voting to be begun as soon as arrangements can be made. Votes to be deposited with Mrs. S. E. Wooster, secretary of the committee. Five cents per vote will be charged, the proceeds to be used to defray the expenses of the celebration.
3. A musical program under the direction of Mrs. R. G. McCall to be given in the Park at the close of the parade.
4. Picnic lunch in the Park at noon.
5. Delivery of the Declaration of Independence and an address by the orator of the day following lunch.
6. Jitney dance in the Park Pavilion beginning at one o'clock.
7. A full program of sports in the afternoon.

- Music, Mrs. R. G. McCall.
- Parade Stunts, J. K. Ely.
- Selection of Speaker, H. C. Stevens.
- Marshal of the Day, Henry Boyer.

It is hoped that the people of Estacada and vicinity will give loyal support to the committee who are arranging this celebration. An opportunity will be

given to everyone to vote for the Goddess of Liberty. Come on, boys, and show the girls that all of your protestations of the past year have not been simply hot air! Let us have every auto in Estacada and vicinity decorated and in the parade. Let's work up such a variety of "stunts" as was never before seen in Estacada.

Five dollars will be charged for each concession for stands and lunch counters, the proceeds to be used in defraying the expenses of the day. Apply for concessions to the secretary, Mrs. S. E. Wooster.

It is expected that the American Legion of Portland will join with the people of Estacada in this celebration and furnish a band for the occasion.

Voting on the Goddess of Liberty will close Saturday evening, June 26, at ten o'clock. Daily bulletins announcing the progress of the vote will be displayed in the window of Wooster's Real Estate office. Tickets for the vote are to be obtained from the secretary. A prize for best decorated float in parade will be given.
