A Typical Chzinese Monument
The Chinese bury their dead on the mountain side where the earth is dry and there is less danger of floods. The monuments are built along the highway to inform the public of the great men who have lived and died in the neighboring villages.
A brief history of the dead man serves as an epitaph, and a tortoise or dragon, carved into the stone, symbolizes eternal life.
Death is an expensive proposition for the Chinaman. Only the leaders of community life are honored by monuments along the highway. But by the time even the average citiwith numerous pallbearers paidfeasts for the mourners-well, it's cheaper to live.
There is an average of one doctor to every 400,000 Chinese. So the Interchurch. World Movement, in which America's evangelical bodies are cooperating, intends to cut opening a large number for China by pitals and by strengthening existing institutions.
