Farmers Paying the Bills

With continuous agitation and threatened legislation to have the government take over or regulate the meat packing business, the market for live stock has not been helped.

Those who believe the stockyards and the great meat packing houses are a menace to the producer and the consumer, are numerous, and it is very easy to appeal to the stomachs of the multitude with savory legislation.

But legislation and government taking over transportation and manufacturing of anything, has never helped the consumer a penny, and has never made a market for a steer, a hog or a sheep—in spite of good intentions.

It is refreshing that a number of western senators voted to kill the Kenyon bill to regulate the packing industry—on top of all present governmental regulating and investigating and commission muckraking.

This crusade will do for the packing industry what ten years of similar methods have done for the railroads—put them where no one of ordinary business intelligence will build a mile of railroad.

Senator Stanfield, of Oregon, who is one of the largest sheepmen in the west, made an able and courageous speech for individual initiative and enterprise in the packing industry, and to oppose govern ownership and control.—The Manufacturer.

THE second state to adopt the Constitution was Pennsylvania. Its area of 45,120 square miles is larger than the combined New England states, except Maine, with New Jersey thrown in for good measure.

Pennsylvania has assumed such an important place among the states that it is often called the Keystone state. This term was probably derived originally because her name was carved on the keystone of the bridge over Rock creek, between Washington and Georgetown.

William Penn first came over to America in 1682. The following year he laid out the city of Philadelphia, or "Brotherly Love," which was named after a biblical city in Asia Minor.

Pine Trees' Peculiar Growth.

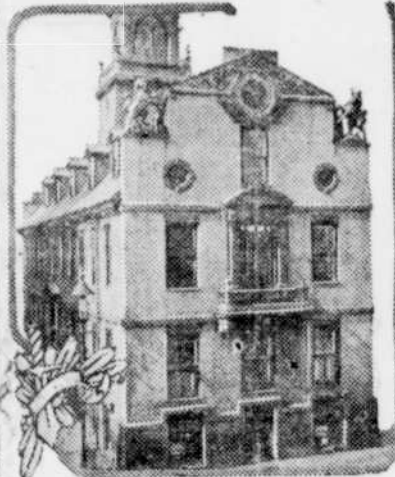
