OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Hop picking will begin near Harrisburg about August 15.

Organization of the Clackamas County Pioneers' association has been effected.

The Cabbage Hill-Deadman's Pass road, a stretch of 12.8 miles on the Pendleton-La Grande road, has been finished.

Governor Olcott has promised to be present and speak at the dedication of the municipal aviation field at Eugene September 5.

Lane county will not produce one-fifth enough peaches for local consumption this year, according to the county fruit inspector.

Leland Smith of Portland, recently appointed to the consular service, has been assigned to the consulate of Saigon, French Indo-China.

Feed for cattle on the low lands of Josephine county is reported to be excellent. The cattle are in fine condition for this time of year.

Allen Johnston, 9 years old, whose parents live in Portland, was drowned in the Columbia river at Rainier when he was caught in a whirlpool.

A. L. Parker, an employee of the Crown Willamette Paper company, was drowned in the Willamette river at Oregon City while bathing.

Fourteen hundred pounds of molasses and 100 pounds of arsenic were sent to Crane Prairie last week to be used as poison for grasshoppers.

Approximately one-third of Umatilla county's 1921 wheat crop, or about 2,000,000 bushels, already has been contracted, the prices ranging near \$1.

The first crop of 1921 barley threshed in Lane county this year yielded 50 bushels to the acre. It was grown on the ranch of Ralph Coon, of Junction City.

The Union Oil company of California has remitted to the secretary of state \$17,706.48, covering the tax on sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon for June.

J. E. Enyart, a former Medford banker, is promoting a company to construct an aerial system to transport tourists from the rim of Crater lake to the lake surface.

Harrisburg hop men are selling out last year's crop as low as 11 cents a pound. This time last year they refused 40 and 45 cents and later in the summer as high as 65 cents.

Work on the Oregon central military wagon road from the Rigdon ranch, 75 miles south of Eugene, to the summit of the Cascades will be completed by the last of this week.

The shortage in Umatilla county road funds due to alleged peculations for which K. C. Amann, clerk in the roadmaster's office, was arrested, will amount to between \$3000 and \$4000.

Jail sentences aggregating about a year, and fines totaling more than \$1500 were the results of recent activities of operatives of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league in Marion county.

C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, reports that labor conditions have improved somewhat during the past few weeks, due to the demand for workers on farms and in the fruit industry.

A. P. Davis, director of the reclamation service, will pass several days in eastern Oregon in August, visiting the Powder river irrigation project August 21 and 22, and the Deschutes project later.

Approximately seven miles of white guard rails will be built on all sharp curves and deep fills on state highways in Umatilla county leading to Pendleton before Round-Up time late in September.

With the lumber mills fast getting back to normalcy in production and a consequent reduction in prices of lumber, the outlook for home construction in Baker is more favorable than for three or four years.

Fire in Brooks-Scanlon slashings along The Dalles-California highway, 13 miles south of Bend, caused so intense a degree of heat that automobile tourists were able to drive through only with the greatest difficulty.

The Oregon Wool & Mohair Growers' association has announced the shipment of ten carloads of market lambs from valley counties as the result of an order for 10,000 breeding lambs which it was asked to fill.

That the body found in the Brumfield auto wreck near Roseburg was that of W. Dennis Russell and that he met his death by gunshot wounds inflicted by a person unknown, was the verdict returned by a coroner's jury

Orders were received at Eugene to move all of the airplanes and men stationed at the base of the forest fire patrol at Medford to the main base at Eugene and all patrols over the state will start from the Eugene flying field. Gasoline stations will continue to be maintained at Medford and Portland.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon has agreed to approve the China trade act sponsored by the Portland Chamber of Commerce, for separate legislative action prior to and independent of the general revenue revision bill.

Members of Bend, Redmond and Prineville lodges of the Woodmen of the World will hold a joint session in Redmond Saturday evening, August 6, to initiate large classes resulting from the central Oregon membership campaign now on.

Word has been received at Dallas that Joseph Dennis, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Dennis, Oakdale farmers, who is serving in the American army of occupation in Germany, was cited recently for bravery for preventing an explosion.

THIRD ANNUAL LINN REUNION

The Linn Clans will hold their third reunion on Sunday in the park. An attractive looking booklet has printed as a souvenir of the occasion, which contains an interesting account drawn up by Matt Lonsberry, of the overland trip taken by Philip Linn and families, from Brown county, Ills., to Oregon, in 1865, from which we take the following:

The families composing the train consisted of—
Philip Linn, wife and eight children.

W. T. Linn, wife and two children.

W. H. Shankland, wife and one child.

T. Bowen, wife and two children.

F. Bullard, wife and five children.

Jonathan Lonsberry, wife and two children.

John A. Linn.

This company left Brown County, Ills., April 25th, 1865, bound for Oregon, and arrived in Clackamas County, near Eagle Creek, October 17, 1865. Here they bought land, settled and lived many years. The neighborhood is now known as Currinsville. Of a family of thirty-two, at that time, six still survive, the others being deceased. Two deaths occurred while on the way, Mrs. Martha Lonsberry dying near American Falls on the Snake river, Idaho, and Jonathan Lonsberry at Bakeoven, near the Deschutes river in Eastern Oregon. John A. Linn after a year's residence in Oregon, returned to Illinois, via the Isthmus of Panama, by water.
