May Get Fortune

The late Wilson T. Hume, the Portland lawyer and legislator, who died last week, was, so the Oregonian states, the lawyer for Mrs. W. A. Heylman, of this place, for the recovery of her interests in the Continental Mining Company of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, which she had acquired through some stock bequeathed her by her father.

The stock had been unnoticed for 20 years. It was found that the mining properties were immensely valuable, but Mrs. Heylman's claims were disputed by a Mr. Clapman, president of the mining company, who had bought up practically all of the stock.

The case began two years ago. Mr. Hume proved a forged power of attorney had been used to obtain the assignment of Mrs. Heylman's stock and won his case. It was appealed and he won again. Offers of cash settlement amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars were made and refused.

Early last September, Mr. Hume broken in health but dauntless in spirit, made a supreme effort. In a bitterly fought suit at Coeur d'Alene, he obtained a court order for an accounting of all minerals shipped out by the company and all properties now owned by it.

The order meant several hundred thousand dollars for Mrs. Heylman and Mr. Hume was to share 50-50 with her. He returned to his home triumphant over the victory and the fortune won.

ORDINANCE NO. 99

AN ORDINANCE declaring the assessment for the improvement of Broadway street from the point in the intersection of Broadway and Second streets, where previously completed pavement stopped, to the tracks of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company in the City of Estacada, Oregon, and directing the Recorder to enter in the Docket of City Liens a statement thereof providing for the notice to property owners of the entry thereof, and declaring an emergency.

Whereas, the City Council has heretofore at the time and in the manner provided by the charter of said city, duly apportioned the cost of the street improvement for improving Broadway street from the point in the intersection of Broadway and Second streets, where previously completed pavement stopped, to the tracks of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company in the City of Estacada, Oregon, upon the lots, parts of lots, and parcels of land in the assessment district in accordance with the provisions of the said charter; and

Whereas, the Council now adopts said assessment as apportioned and hereby directs the Recorder to enter a statement thereof in the Docket of City Liens.

Be It Ordained by the City of Estacada, Oregon, that for the street improvements of Broadway street from the point in the intersection of Broadway and Second streets, where previously completed pavement stopped, to the tracks of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, the following assessments are hereby declared and levied against the following lots, parts of lots, or parcels of land in said City, to-wit:

M. E. Hendrick, lot 23, block 6.....	59.26

Be It Further Resolved that the Recorder be, and he is hereby directed to enter in the Docket of City Liens a statement thereof containing:

1. The number or letter of the lot assessed, and the number or letter of block in which it is situated; and if a separate assessment is made on a part of a lot, a particular designation of such part.
2. The name of the owner or that the owner is unknown.
3. The sum assessed upon each lot or part thereof, and the date of the entry; and

Be It Further Resolved that upon the entry of said assessments in said bond lien docket, the Recorder do forthwith notify the owners of the lots, parts of lots of the amount so assessed; and that the same may be paid or bonded within twenty days from the date thereof without penalty, interest, or costs; that the Recorder is further directed to give this notice by publication for ten days in a weekly newspaper published in Clackamas County, and that he further send a notice of such assessment by mail in all cases where the post office address of the owner or agent is known, and that he also personally serve the owner of each lot or part of lot when such service can be made in the City of Estacada; and

Whereas, the aforesaid street has been improved and it is necessary to procure funds to pay for same;

Now-Therefore, an emergency is hereby declared and this ordinance shall go into force and effect upon its adoption and approval.

Passed by the Council this 25th day of September, 1921, by the following vote:
