Daniel W. Robertson, a well known farmer, resident of Clackamas county, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. C. Stephens, near Portland, on Tuesday, December 13, 1921. Death was due to natural causes. The deceased was 82 years old. He was born in Edwardsport, Indiana, September 23, 1839. At the outbreak of the civil war he enlisted in Company B, of the 26th Indiana regiment, and served from 1861 to 1866, and was discharged as the captain of his company. A short time after the war he moved to Missouri where he married Miss Mary Hill. There were ten children born to this union. In 1873 he moved to Oregon with his family and settled in Marion county near Jefferson, and later near Salem,
