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CHRISTMAS GREETING
 The editor wishes to everyone a very happy Christmas. And if it is a happy one it will be a joyful one. The word *merry*, which is generally used in connection, is too limited. There are some to whom Christmas cannot be a merry one, but it may be both happy and joyful. In fact the Christmas message is directed especially to those who are in sorrow, as it tells of the advent of Him, Who came to bind up the broken hearted, and to comfort those who mourn.

THE ANGELIC EVANGEL
 Until the revised version of the New Testament was published the familiar rendering of the angels' song on the first Christmas night was, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men." The revisers changed the latter clause to read, "And on earth peace among men in whom He is well pleased." Another rendering is "peace to men of goodwill." This is the one quoted by Marshall Foch on his recent visit and is, we believe, that of the Latin version, which is authoritative in the Church of Rome.

The reason for this diversity, is that there are two renderings of a word in the text of the manuscripts. The one which the translators of the Authorized, or King James version used, had the word translated "good will" in the nominative. But since that time other manuscripts were discovered which placed this noun in the possessive case. This made it most difficult to express in English, and the revisers acknowledged that their translation, "in whom He is well pleased," was by no means a happy one. In fact this verse has been termed the worst translated one in the revised version. No one was satisfied, and only the weight of authority of those manuscripts which gave the word in the possessive prevented its rejection. Professor Harnack, the leading German theologian, translated the line as "Peace of His gracious will to men."

But none of these translations took the place in popular estimation, of that of "goodwill toward men." And it has not been without its defenders among scholars. Only recently a Prof. Ropes has championed it and has made out a strong case on its behalf. He says, "the verse is a trisitch," and writes it thus:
 "Glory in the highest to God,
 And on earth peace,
 Among men goodwill."

The writer of late years has used generally the revised rendering when quoting this passage, but did so with regret. Somehow "peace on earth, goodwill toward men," appeals more forcibly to him than the others, and seems more in keeping with the universal scope of the work of Him, whose birth was thus heralded.

He was to bring peace to the whole earth, and cause all men to have goodwill toward one another. This was the purpose of his coming, as predicted by the ancient prophecy that men "should beat their swords into plow shares and their spears into pruning hooks; nations shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. But they shall sit every man under his vine and under his fig tree; and none shall make them afraid."
 So at the Christ-Mass, when

assembled in His House to give Him birthday greetings, we can join with firm conviction and heartfelt devotion in the great burst of praise "with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven."
 "Glory be to God on high, and on earth peace, goodwill towards men."

AMERICAN RED CROSS
 Disabled veterans of the world war, more than 29,000 of them in United States public health service, government, military and contract hospitals and soldiers' homes throughout the country, will have the happiest kind of Christmas this year, if the efforts of American Red Cross workers can make it possible.

Making December 25 Christmas in spirit as well as in letter is one of the duties of the Red Cross worker in the hospital where the disabled veteran is receiving treatment. Acting in close cooperation with the hospital authorities, the Red Cross hospital workers have for weeks busied themselves with plans for Christmas. While it is the province of the Red Cross to plan and supervise Christmas entertainment and recreation in the hospitals, veterans' organizations, women's and civic clubs and other groups and countless individuals are contributing their active support.

Doing their share toward making Christmas happy is not confined to this country alone by the Junior Red Cross members. Christmas boxes for 100,000 needy children of central Europe have been prepared by the school children of America and shipped overseas for distribution on Christmas day, to bring into the lives of Europe's distressed and destitute childhood the significance of the Christmas season.

CHRISTMAS EDITIONS
 As usual the Portland **SPECTATOR** and the Gresham **OUTLOOK** have issued special Christmas numbers. The former is resplendent in a brilliant green and scarlet cover printed on plate paper. The design is an original one, and the work, we believe of a Portland artist, Miss Phyllis Muirden who has evidently been influenced by the futurist school. There is a superb supplement of eight pages giving "Views of Our City Beautiful and the Columbia River Highway." It is a fine number to mail to friends in the east.

The **OUTLOOK** contains three sections, making twenty pages in all, and is a model of what a Christmas number of a country newspaper should be. The work was done entirely by **OUTLOOK's** force, which affords striking testimony to the excellency of the workmen and the plant. The merchants by generous patronage of advertising space show that they appreciate Bro. St. Clair's efforts. The **NEWS** extends the heartiest congratulations to all concerned.

BANKERS TO HELP EUROPE
 American bankers must help re-establish the financial integrity of Europe in the opinion of a prominent western banker.

That is the only way out of the terrible financial chaos under which world markets and economic conditions are buried. Following is the broad statesmanlike view of A. L. Mills, president of the First National Bank of Portland, a financial authority:
 "The regeneration of the civilized world rests on the extension of long-time loans by the United States to European countries."
 "In Great Britain conditions are bad—unemployment is a problem, Germany is under-selling the manufacturers. Steel blames coal, which in turn blames labor. Retailers blame wholesalers, and all these blame the

government.
 "The old fighting bulldog spirit is still in the English nature, however, and with a sound credit on a long-time basis can pay her old obligations, which she has already started to do."
 "France, in her traditional thrifty manner, is staging a comeback."
 "Belgium and Italy by the same token will recover their financial standings. Out-law Russia, uncertain South American nations, staggering China and proud, selfish Japan, have problems to solve that will of necessity involve other nations. Sweden is coming under control of the socialists. Austria is beyond redemption, a hopeless bankrupt, and Germany is in a position of the loser of the war. She has no armament program to keep up.

The slogan for the state legislature now in session, should be: "Out of the Capitol by Christmas." And it can be done, if it will attend strictly to the business placed before it by the governor and nothing else.
