**THE SPECIAL SESSION**

The special session of the legislature accomplished nothing but stirring up a row, according to Senator Bruce Dennis of Eastern Oregon, and one of the "14" who were "agin" the whole program. He writes: "Bitterness marked the closing of the session. Senators who favored the fair in many instances refused to shake hands, refused to respond to the Eastern Oregon greeting of Merry Christmas, but answered such remarks with curses and threats for the future."

Well that is too bad, but they might have expected such a result, for those districts represented by the fourteen senators, have not yet been educated up to the idea that the fair will be a benefit to the whole state. They regard the project, wrongly we believe, as a Portland affair, to exploit itself. They are willing Portland should have the fair if it will do the financing itself.

When the special session was called we had our doubts as to its advisability, as nothing much had been done to convert the eastern, central and southern portions of the state. The old motto applies in this case, "more haste, less speed." Some twenty or more years ago the Methodist Episcopal Church decided to raise \$20,000,000 in three years. At that time the proposition was most startling. But the leaders of the undertaking were men of great shrewdness. Instead of making a drive for subscriptions right away, they spent the first half of the period in educating their people as to the reason why this money was wanted, how it should be spent, and the benefits which would result to the church. As a consequence, general interest was aroused and subscriptions came readily.

*Haec fabula docet*, let the fair promoters prepare to carry out an intensive missionary campaign all over the state, and especially *In partibus infidelium*, as represented by the territory of the objecting senators. Not that they are likely to convert the senators, but they have a good chance with their constituents. We cannot speak for central or southern Oregon, but we know something of the constituents of Senator Bruce Dennis. These are neither selfish nor envious of Portland and western Oregon, but they are conservative, and in matters of taxation want first to be shown.

If this is done, and a general interest aroused throughout the state, as idea gains ground that it is a whole state project, and not one for Portland only, the delay will be more than offset, so that those who now curse the recalcitrant fourteen, may end by blessing them.

A Portland minister acknowledges that while engaged in war work he contracted the habit of saying "darn," and that it still clings to him. He also admits under strong provocation using the stronger form on one occasion, in reference to a certain individual. For this he has been censured by some of his congregation. We should advise him in future when thus tempted to express himself in Latin, and then he will be able to cite very high ecclesiastical authority for so doing. He has our sympathy for we know by experience what it is, when one's canonical vocabulary is too limited to meet the exigencies of the situation.

**CONSERVE BIRD LIFE**

The national Grange in its late session at Portland, Ore., went on record for conservation of bird life, asking all granges to protect birds. The resolutions recite that birds are a great factor in preserving and maintaining all forms of vegetable life to help feed the world. They call attention to the fact that the birds do destroy innumerable insects injurious to all forms of vegetation.

The slaughter of birds by the sportsmen and others has resulted in the tremendous increase of destructive insects, says the national grange. They urge all subordinate granges and farmers organizations to do their utmost to bring the economic value of birds to the knowledge of all the people and call for the passage and enforcement of laws that will conserve native and migratory birds.

The Audubon and Humane societies unite to protest against killing of crows, (send for U. S. agriculture bulletins 621 and 1102,) because of their value to agriculture.

The federal government is expending millions exterminating rodents, which has been made necessary because farmers killed off hawks and owls, birds which prevented rodents from becoming destructive pests.

**Clackamas County Budget**

Taxpayers at the annual budget meeting last Friday voted for the elimination of two deputy clerks in the courthouse, cut the tax collector's salary and the salary of his chief deputy, abolished the office of county club leader, abolished all overtime in the tax department, pruned the allowance for traffic law enforcement so as to provide for one instead of two officers, cut the expense allowance of the circuit court \$500, and practically halved the appropriation for the salaries and expenses of the county health officer and county physician.

They also killed moves to establish a county health nurse, a county poor farm and a county library.

The only increase in the entire budget as outlined was made in the fund provided for enforcement of the prohibition statutes. The \$1500 for this purpose, upon resolution introduced by District Attorney Stipp, was taken from the sheriff's budget, augmented by \$500 and placed under the control of the county court. Under this arrangement expenses incurred by both the sheriff's office and the district attorney in this work can be paid from a fund provided for the purpose. A \$6500 fund provided in the budget for the building of a new county jail was approved.—Oregon City Enterprise.

**Mail Banking Course.**

Young business men everywhere in the state have been given an opportunity to prepare for advancement by the Extension Division of the University of Oregon which is offering a new correspondence course in Banking Procedure and Practice.

This is a university course, making it possible for the student living anywhere in Oregon to receive instruction similar to that given in the same subject on the campus at Eugene. It was prepared by Professor Franklin E. Folts, instructor in Business Finance in the university. It carries six term hours of university credit.

The course contains thirty-two lessons, as follows: introduction; the business man and his bank; the organization and management of the bank; the business of banking; bank accounting; the receiving teller's department; paying and the paying teller; Clearing and the clearing house; transits and the transit department; collections and the collection department; foreign exchange; accumulating ex-

**The Story of Our States**

 XVIII.—LOUISIANA



THE discovery of Louisiana dates back to the beginning of the sixteenth century, when the Spanish explorers, Alvarez de Pineda and De Soto sailed up the Mississippi. In 1682 La Salle descended the Mississippi and took possession of the entire valley in the name of the French king, Louis XIV. In his honor this region was named Louisiana. French colonies soon sprang up, including New Orleans, which was founded in 1718.

An interesting chapter of Louisiana was the formation of the Company of the West by a financial schemer named John Law. This company ostensibly was to exploit the new colony and held out to speculators an alluring get-rich-quick scheme.

In 1763 France ceded Louisiana east of the Mississippi to England, and, by secret treaty, New Orleans and the western territory went to Spain. Spanish rule proved unendurable to the inhabitants and the restrictions over the navigation of the Mississippi led to hostilities between the northern American settlements and Spain. This situation, however, was brought to a peaceful termination by Spain relinquishing her rights to this territory to France and the purchase in 1803 by the United States from France of the entire Louisiana territory.

The southern portion of this acquisition was organized as the territory of Orleans and in 1812 was admitted as the eighteenth state of the Union, with an area of 48,506 square miles. As the Louisiana coat-of-arms has a pelican in its center, the state is often called the Pelican State. (© by McClure Newspaper Syndicate.)
