Big Fire at County Seat
Last Friday at midnight there was a big conflagration in Oregon City at corner of 11th and Main streets. It destroyed the Clackamas County Auto and Tractor Co.'s building with contents, the Busch building including hall and apartment house and injured adjacent buildings. The loss is estimated at \$168,500. The firemen did heroic service in which they were aided by the old volunteer firemen, as owing to the presence of explosives in the building, and gasoline tanks at the filling station the work was extremely hazardous.
