

STANDARD OIL

To Erect Distributing Station in Estacada--Will Be Big Asset to the City

The Standard Oil Company (California) has announced that they will, within a very short period, begin the erection of a distributing station at Estacada.

This is the most important addition to local business institutions that has taken place in some time, and has a big bearing on the financial and commercial welfare of this city. The decision of the Standard Oil Company to establish their distributing plant here was reached only after a thorough analytical study of business conditions, and the growth of the city and the community surrounding Estacada, with a particular view to its possibilities of expansion and progress, and it expresses the Standard Oil Company's judgment and confidence in the future of this community.

It is expected that the twenty to twenty-five thousand dollars will be expended in the new institution which will be open for business within sixty days.

In the past Estacada and the surrounding community have been served from the Standard Oil Company's Substation at Park Place, but the increase in the amount of business done and the demands for more thorough service in the country tributary to this city, has been one of the reasons why this local station is to be built.

The station which the Standard Oil Company will build will consist of the necessary large storage tanks and warehouse facilities for handling the principal products of the Company, which are Pearl Oil, Red Crown Gasoline, Standard Engine Distillate, Zerolene Oils and Greases, as well as the oils and greases required for industrial uses. Facilities will also be provided for storing the motor equipment which will be used in giving service from the new Estacada Station. All buildings will be constructed of corrugated iron and will be as nearly fire proof as possible. One of the features of all Standard Oil Stations is the neat appearance, as the buildings, tanks and equipment are kept painted and clean. Every precaution will be taken for fire prevention, as no smoking is permitted on or around the property, and the carrying of matches by employees and other persons entering the plant is strictly prohibited. Supplies handled in tankage are received by tank ship at the Company's main station at Willbridge (Portland, Ore.) direct from the Refinery at Richmond, California, and will then be transported by tank car from Willbridge to Estacada.

"SERVICE" is the watchword adopted by the Standard Oil Company, and Service is rendered by the Company in every sense of the word. Special pains will be taken to supply the Red Crown Gasoline requirements of the many dealers in the district covered by this station, as well as the requirements for petroleum products of the farmers and industries in the community.

The entrance of the Standard Oil Company as a direct business in Estacada will mean a big thing for the community, not only in the way of an increase in the payroll of the city but the improved service that will be possible from having a distributing plant located at Estacada.

Oregon Growers Meeting

A meeting of the Oregon Growers Co-operative Association was held last Saturday in the lobby of the hotel, for the purpose of nominating a director and electing a local advisory committee. C. A. Jacques of Garfield, was renominated for director and B. Schoenberg, A. W. Botkin, W. W. Tucker and H. D. Trapp were elected as the advisory committee. A fifth member will be elected later. Earl Percy of the Salem office field department, presided and a goodly number of the Estacada berry growers attended. The question of them affiliating with the Association, was discussed, and the strongest argument made in favor of such consolidation, was to the effect that better co-operation among the growers, increased selling facilities with higher efficiency in all industrial operations would result instead of a divided interest in a district barely large enough for one association to function properly. Plans are under way whereby it is believed that an arrangement agreeable and beneficial to all concerned, will be worked out placing the fruit growers of this district on a solid foundation in one instead of several foundations.
