STRIKERS EMPLOY THUGS
 The strike situation in Portland is becoming more acute. According to the police there is a specially organized "strong-arm" gang of strikers that travels by auto. They spot their men and attack them in places where they know there will be no police interference until after they have accomplished their purpose. Police protection for individual strikebreakers is impossible, they say, and strikebreakers who venture from the docks, where they can be protected, do so at their own peril.

In spite of this intimidation there seems to be no dearth of men applying for work at the docks. It is evident then that the wages offered by the employers are acceptable to many who are out of work. The action of the strikers is in direct violation of the rights of others to work, who are not professional strikebreakers but men who need work to support themselves and their families. But such methods will defeat their own ends by alienating all public sympathy from the strikers.
