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OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Work has begun on the highway between Harrisburg and Junction City.

The Silverton schools have passed from secondary to first class schools. Re-establishing the mail route between Canyon City and Burns is now assured.

Mrs. Horace Richards is the first woman ever to be chairman of a Bend school board.

Fourteen applicants, all of whom were women, took the state teachers' examination at Fossil.

Many improvements in Mount Angel during the last few months indicate a rapidly progressing town.

Sale of \$123,000 worth of street-improvement bonds was authorized by the Klamath Falls city council.

Dr. C. W. Lassen of Pendleton was elected president of the Oregon state board of veterinary examiners.

A city manager plan of government for St. Helens is proposed in a charter amendment now being drafted.

The Hood River 1922 apple crop bids fair to be one of the cleanest and largest sized harvested in recent years.

Citizens of Condon at a special election last week voted, about 20 to one, to authorize an issue of water bonds.

The longshoremen's strike, which has been in progress since April 23 on Portland's waterfront has been settled.

The contract for rebuilding Happy Canyon in Pendleton, wrecked by the heavy snows of last winter, has been let.

Alleged failure to enforce prohibition laws, and general inefficiency on the part of Ole Nelson, sheriff of Clatsop county, are said to be the basis of petitions asking a special election to recall the sheriff.

Tom Christensen, 38, prominent farmer and stockman, was instantly killed at Haines when a hay derrick he was moving came in contact with a high voltage line of the Western Oregon Light & Power company.

Otis Patterson has resigned as one of the board of appraisers for Grant county, representing the world war veterans' state aid commission for Oregon. E. B. Moore of John Day has been recommended as his successor.

J. C. Stevens, engineer for the Klamath Drainage district, filed with the state engineer tentative plans by which the district expects to issue bonds in the sum of \$20,000 and to develop approximately 27,000 acres of land.

GRAND CELEBRATION PLANNED FOR 4TH

The Carl Douglass Post, American Legion, with much expenditure of time and effort, has made arrangements for a worth while celebration of the glorious Fourth. The proceedings will commence at 10 a. m. with a grand parade starting at the school campus headed by Campbell's American band, which is one of Portland's best. In the parade there will be novelties in floats entered by various business houses, lodges and individuals, while the World War veterans will march in a body. The exercises will take place on arrival at the park which has been generously donated for the occasion by the P. R. L. & P. Co., which has also helped by placing large advertising posters on their street cars. A patriotic program has been drawn up and the address of the day will be by the Rev. A. F. Lacy, pastor of the M. E. Church, who is a virile and eloquent speaker.

A picnic dinner will follow the program, and at 1:30 sharp a snappy ball game has been provided between Estacada and the Portland firemen, who are a particularly strong team, so there will be something exciting all the time. After this, races and other athletic contests, with boxing and wrestling bouts, will be pulled off. Both afternoon and evening there will be dancing in the pavilion, the music being furnished by an excellent orchestra. The usual concessions for the sale of refreshments will be made, so it will not be necessary for those in the park to go up town to procure ice cream, drinks, etc.

The young lady for the Goddess of Liberty will be chosen by vote. The polling places are the Pharmacy and Marchbank's confectionery, and the polls will close Sunday at 9 p. m., so there is not much more time. Votes are five cents a piece.

It becomes all people in this vicinity to turn out and help the Carl Douglass Post make this celebration a memorable one, especially in stimulating the community spirit and feeling. It is in this respect that the day will be most patriotically and fittingly observed.
