## Oue Cause of Hard Times

One of the largest hop growers was unable to pick 25 per cent of his crop and a large prune grower suffered the same loss simply because they could not get a normal supply of help that would pick either prunes or hops, at good wages. These two growers are typical of many others.

A few years ago pickers would go into the hop or prune fields, work hard during the season, keep their agreements to stay until the crops were harvested and at the end of a few weeks have a good round sum of money to put in the bank.

Today a picker will contract to stay until the crop is harvested but instead of staying, as he agreed, he will pick a few days, decide the work doesn't suit him, collect his money and leave without notice.

In other words, the integrity, honesty, and industriousness of these workers are far below what they were when wages were lower and hours much longer than today.

The plain facts of the case are that too many people who howl the loudest about lack of opportunity and work simply won't work. Too many of these so-called workers are like mamma's spoiled boy, if they can't have just what they want they set up a cry, go to some board, commission or bureau, magnify their grievances and in the past have secured their demands.—Manufacturer.

## For Schools and Roads

Oregon and Washington have just received \$179,418.85 from the federal government for roads and schools. Oregon, second on the list draws \$110,015.21, while Washington receives \$69,303.64. The above amount goes to the counties of the two states in which there are national forest areas.

The governors of 28 states have just been notified that 25% of the \$3,421,531 received from timber sales, grazing permits and other sources of national forest revenue for the past fiscal year will be distributed by the forest service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. These moneys are returned to states in which national forests are located for expenditure upon schools and roads.
