Feed Store in New Location

Bartholomew and Lawrence have moved their feed store from the building on Broadway to the new one at the corner of Main and Second streets, across from the postoffice. This building, which belongs to J. F. Lovelace, was especially erected for them, and is an iron structure 24x60 feet. A neat shingled porch and cement sidewalk are in front and an inclined runway extends from the door to the floor of the building. The side entrance has a platform on a level with the floor so teams can back up and unload. A platform scale made by the Toledo Scale Co. of Ohio, has been installed and is the only one of its make in town. A neat office has been partitioned off at one corner in front, of ceiled lumber. The store has not yet been painted but this will be done in light grey with scarlet trimmings, according to the mode adopted by the Standard Oil Company for its station buildings. The firm now has commodious storage room for its rapidly increasing business.
