> Poster Used in Tuberculosis Eradication Campaign.

Careful Experiments Have Demonstrated That Disease Cannot Be Detected to Any Great Extent by Physical Examinations.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.) Unlike most other infectious discases, tuberculosis has an insidious way of working under cover, and oftentimes animals of the most healthy appearance are found to react to the tuberculin test, say veterinarians of the United States Department of Agriculture. No cattle owner can afford to live in doubt as to whether his animals are affected, they add. This point is brought out clearly in a two-colored poster published by the department, on which is shown two herds of dairy cattle. From all appearances the animals of both herds are healthy, but as a matter of fact those of one herd are afflicted with tuberculosis,

The poster also shows two children -one healthy, one diseased-and the road district for road purposes point is brought out that tuberculous as by law provided.






