**Short Course in Farm Subjects**

Several short courses in practical farming are offered Oregon farmers this winter by the agricultural college as follows:

Eleven weeks in tractor mechanics, January 2 to March 17.

Eleven weeks in general agriculture, same date.

Eleven weeks in horticulture, same date.

Five months as dairy herdsman, January 2 to June 10.

Four weeks in dairy manufacture, January 2 to 27, repeated January 28 to February 24.

Short course in horticultural products—canning, drying, jellies, etc., February 5 to 24.

One week in beekeeping, March 19 to 24.

The work deals with methods of growing leading crops, handling livestock, learning to run a tractor and care for it, handling the orchard, garden, berry patch and flower garden, managing dairy animals, butter, cheese and ice-cream making, managing bees, and converting fresh fruit and vegetables into conserved products.

The courses are explained in a small pamphlet free to those interested. Write O. A. C., Corvallis, Oregon.

**Taxes Must Be Reduced**

Judging from the way congress has taken hold of tax reduction it is a more responsive legislative body than state legislatures. Operating expenses of the government for the year ending July 1, 1922, were 1,743 million dollars less than for the year preceding. On top of this the national debt was reduced 1,700 million dollars and taxes to be collected from the people reduced 800 million dollars.

State governments have got to make a similar snowing if the men who are elected to state offices and to the legislatures have any brains. If they have no brains to adapt the state government to the reduced incomes of farmers and wages of labor they will be severely cursed.

The political power entrusted to them by the people will be taken back and there will be more use of the recall than was ever dreamed of.

In every western state officials are going into power on promises to impose no new taxes and to make material reductions.

Useless political functions that cannot show actual services rendered for every dollar expended must go by the board.—Industrial News Bureau.

**STRONG APPEAL MADE FOR HEALTHY CATTLE**

**Poster Used in Tuberculosis Eradication Campaign.**

Careful Experiments Have Demonstrated That Disease Cannot Be Detected to Any Great Extent by Physical Examinations.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Unlike most other infectious diseases, tuberculosis has an insidious way of working under cover, and oftentimes animals of the most healthy appearance are found to react to the tuberculin test, say veterinarians of the United States Department of Agriculture. No cattle owner can afford to live in doubt as to whether his animals are affected, as they add. This point is brought out clearly in a two-colored poster published by the department, on which is shown two herds of dairy cattle. From all appearances the animals of both herds are healthy, but as a matter of fact those of one herd are afflicted with tuberculosis.

The poster also shows two children—one healthy, one diseased—and the point is brought out that tuberculous

animals may transmit the disease to children who drink the milk produced. The poster is a strong appeal for healthy cattle, and it is to be used extensively in the tuberculosis eradication campaign being carried on by the department.

Careful experiments in practical work have shown that tuberculosis cannot be detected to any great extent among animals by physical examinations. The most reliable method is the tuberculin test applied by a trained operator. Tuberculin, while regarded as the most accurate diagnostic agency known to science, is safe only in the hands of a trained and skillful operator who is acquainted with its limitations and with the symptoms it produces in the animals to which it is applied, the department veterinarians say.

**Cooperative Marketing Gets Boost.**

Farm and town organizations as well as individual farmers of Clackamas county, as well as all others in Oregon, are told how to get help in studying out their cooperative marketing problems in a new bulletin by the agricultural Extension service. Grange, farmer's unions, farm bureaus and all farm marketing associations are in on this offer. More than seven million dollars worth of Oregon farm produce was sold cooperatively last year. The bulletin tells what has been done, what is to do, and how to go about it, and offers college help in sending speakers and fuller outlines of study to interested organizations "to the limit of our ability." Ask your county agent for a copy. If you have no agent write to the O. A. C. Extension service, Corvallis.
