With a general shortage of common labor the manual worker on the farm is now drawn in unusual volume to the great industrial centers by urgent wage bids for him there. For years this drift of labor from the country to the city has gone on, but hitherto a new supply for the American farmer has flowed constantly from the agricultural districts of Europe. With that supply now shut out by the rigid immigration law, the American farmer has no place to get his necessary labor. He faces directly the danger of not being able to The Campfire girls and the get his heavy work done. And not get his work done the Americam people will not be able to get their food at prices that will be bearable.—New York Herald.

This shows that laws apparently wise in theory may not work out in practice.
