A 22,500-Ruble Stamp.

The soviet postal service of Russia has just issued for the benefit of the famished people of the Volga, a postage stamp that, as they say, beats all records.

It is a postage stamp of 22,500 rubles. Stamp collectors will gladly stick it in their albums, the more so since the purchase of this vignette will not ruin them.

In issuing this novelty the soviet posts hastened to establish the "parity" of the modern ruble and the former kopecks that were used in the times of the hated czars.

One kopeck equals 10,000 rubles. This new stamp of 22,500 rubles is therefore worth 2 1/4 kopecks (old style); that is, a few cents.

It is to be added that this stamp is colored flesh tint and mauve and represents a fist claspng a hammer, with banner bearing humanitarian inscriptions.

Popularity of Rubber Heels.
 Sixty per cent of the shoes manufactured in the United States today are said to be equipped with rubber heels. Shoes for men are more often equipped with rubber heels than shoes for women. It is estimated that 75 per cent of the rubber heels manufactured are for men. The United States census of manufactures of 1920, covering production during 1919, showed that 273,367,206 pairs of leather boots and shoes were manufactured by 1,440 establishments. This was exclusive of slippers and fiber and other footwear not of leather. During the same period the production of rubber heels reached 138,498,769 pairs, and 9,777,085 pairs of rubbers and composition fiber soles were manufactured.
