To Help Students

Some 50 additional students may now receive training at the Oregon Agricultural college as a result of the bequest of Captain John T. Apperson, former member of the board of regents, who turned over the residue of his large estate as an educational loan fund for the use of college students. After the special minor bequests have been deducted the remainder will be invested by the Oregon State Land board, the income to be used for small loans to students who need additional funds to continue in school.

The president of the college and the state superintendent of public instruction are named in the will as the committee to determine the beneficiaries of the fund and the terms of the loan. Applications will be made to this committee which will in turn make such recommendations to the land board as they see fit, and the loan will be made accordingly.

All loans and the interest accruing from them, as soon as repaid will be reinvested by the land board. Should any unlent surplus interest be on hand it too is to be reinvested. Thus the fund is irreducible and will grow larger year by year, to the benefit of an increasing number of worthy young men and women of Oregon.

More than three-fourths of all students now in college are in some degree self-supporting. The existing loan fund is aiding 312 of these students. Nearly \$68,000 has been lent since the fund was established 12 years ago, and of this sum only \$417—less than two-thirds of one per cent—has been lost.
