He retired in 1910 and went to Portland, Ore., and made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Nettie Grable. On May 14, 1914, his wife, Abigail Cooper, passed away in her 80th year and was laid to rest in Multnomah cemetery, and he followed at the age of 89 years and 10 months. The funeral was held at Kenworthy Chapel, Sellwood, with interment in Multnomah cemetery. He leaves one brother, Albert Cooper, of Oskaloosa, Iowa; Mrs. Nettie Grable, a daughter, and three sons, W. E. Cooper of Harlan, Iowa and Albert and Robert Cooper of Portland, Oregon.
