OREGON NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

The Pendleton Tribune, established in 1878, has announced its suspension as a daily paper.

Between 500 and 600 grammar school students in Marion county will be graduated this year.

A project for the organization of the Astoria Golf and Country club has been launched at Astoria.

The lumber shipments by water from the Columbia river for May were the largest in several months.

Pioneers of the inland empire, mostly from Umatilla county, gathered at Weston for the annual pioneer picnic.

A total of 675 accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission during the week ended May 31.

Lebanon is to have a genuine wild west round-up during the annual Strawberry Festival which will be held Friday and Saturday.

Feeding of potatoes to sheep is profitable, experiments in Malheur county show, according to the state livestock sanitary board.

Two men were committed from Umatilla county to the eastern Oregon state hospital as the result of drinking moonshine whisky.

William F. Gratke, who has been secretary of the Astoria chamber of commerce during the past two years, has tendered his resignation.

Hardware dealers from all parts of the Willamette valley assembled in Salem and discussed a proposal to organize a permanent association.

About five hundred members of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon attended the annual meeting held at Union, Monday and Tuesday.

The city street department of Eugene has just completed an asphalt paving plant and will start the work of repairing all streets in the city paved with asphalt.

The state land department turned over to the state treasurer during the month of May a total of \$105,987.35, according to a report prepared by George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board.

Two hundred and seventy cars of all grades of lumber were shipped during May by the Baker White Pine Lumber company of Baker, establishing a new record for the eastern Oregon district.

Franchell & Parelus of Portland have received the contract for the erection of the new gymnasium on the Willamette university campus. The cost of the building will be approximately \$75,000.

George I. Smith of Portland has assumed the duties of state parole officer at Salem. He succeeds Jack Little, also of Portland, who is slated for the position of secretary of the child welfare commission.

Ben W. Olcott, ex-governor of Oregon, has accepted a position with the credit department of the Bank of Italy of San Francisco, Cal., according to word brought to Portland by friends of Mr. Olcott.

According to statistics compiled by Deputy Collector of Customs R. D. Lamb at Astoria, 82 vessels loaded a grand total of 83,820,996 feet of lumber which left the Columbia river in cargoes during the month.

Opening of the Salem canneries for the season's operations has resulted in an unusual demand for the issuance of working permits to children between the ages of 14 and 18 years, according to C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.
