## OREGON NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of  
Past Week Briefly Com-  
piled for Our Readers.

No more plank roads will be laid  
in Warrenton, by decree of the city  
council.

Thirty delegates attended the an-  
nual conference of the regional cham-  
ber of the Red Cross at Salem.

George N. Frazer, pioneer foundry  
man of Eugene, died at his home in  
that city at the age of 73 years.

With more than 100 members present  
the Oregon Deaf association held  
its annual convention at Salem.

Organization of the Oregon Logan-  
berry Growers' Co-operative exchange  
was completed at Salem and officers  
and directors elected.

Crook county municipal improve-  
ment bonds in the amount of \$94,000  
were certified at a meeting of the  
state irrigation securities commission.

Due to the many late spring rains  
the cherry harvest in the Silverton  
community will be small this season,  
says the manager of the Silverton can-  
nery.

Annual movement of sheep from the  
home ranges in Wasco, Jefferson and  
northern Deschutes counties to sum-  
mer pastures in the national forests  
is on.

### An Envious Trip

of the Bunker Hill lead mine.  
They visited Mr. Bard's brother  
Charles at Oakdale, Wash., and  
then returned through the Sno-  
qualmie pass to Seattle, Tacoma,  
Portland and home. The crops  
and roads were good, and the  
weather fine, no rain nor dust.  
They covered about 1,800 miles  
in their itinerary.

### June Rainfall Short

Weather forecaster Wells an-  
nounces that so far the June  
rainfall is .32 of an inch short  
of the average, and that since  
September 1 of last year, there  
has been a shortage of 6.98  
inches, and since the first of the  
year of 6.30 inches. He ex-  
plained that usually the June  
rains are heavier and farther be-  
tween. As regards the temper-  
ature which many consider to be  
cooler, than normal for this time  
of the year, he says that from  
the first to the 20th of the month  
it has been practically at the  
average.

### Cherry Spray

Keep the worms out of the late  
cherries by spraying a little poi-  
soned sweetened water on the  
outer surface of the top leaves  
in the cherry tree. The materi-  
al is lead arsenate ½ pound, mol-  
lasses or sirup 2 quarts, and wa-  
ter 10 gallons. Just drive at a  
moderate gait along the rows and  
do not stop while the rodmán  
flashes a small amount on each  
tree top. This will not be enough  
to poison the fruit but will attract  
the flies that otherwise will lay  
their eggs in the cherry.—O. A.  
C. Exp. station.

found it rather painful, and that

were made in the early part of

## BOY SHOT IN HEAD SUNDAY MAY DIE

Ray Brumage, 15 year old boy  
of the Jefferson High School at  
Portland, met with a serious ac-  
cident Sunday, which is thought  
will prove fatal. With three boy  
companions, he was camping on  
the Reed ranch on the river  
about four miles from Estacada.  
The four boys had been shooting  
off a .22 calibre rifle, and had  
emptied it and set it down. One  
of the boys picked it up again  
and loaded it without the knowl-  
edge of the others. Then an-  
other one thinking it was unloa-  
ded, picked it up and pulled the  
trigger. The bullet struck the  
Brumage boy under the right eye  
lodged in the head, rendering  
him unconscious.

One of the boys ran a mile to  
get assistance, and the sufferer  
was brought to town to the hotel  
and Dr. Midford summoned,  
who rendered first aid, and at-  
tended to him, until early the  
next morning, when an ambu-  
lance arrived from Portland, to  
take him to the Emanuel hospital  
where no hope is entertained for  
his recovery.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs.  
M. L. Brumage of 1183 Michigan  
avenue, and his sister Miss Greta  
taught the 2nd grade in the Es-  
tacada school this last school  
year.
