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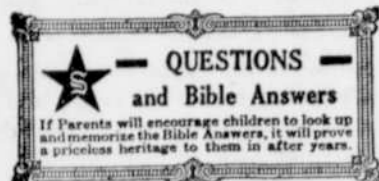

THE SACRIFICIAL PRINCIPLE

Lord Birkenhead, ex-Lord Chancellor of England, in his lecture last week before the Williamson (Mass.) institute of politics, gave advice which will be much endorsed by the majority of the American people. He declared:

"I, for myself, have no delusions as to the only function which the American government is called upon to discharge. Their primary, and indeed, their only duty, is to the American people."

"If by intervention in the affairs of a stricken Europe they can advance the fortunes of the American people, then it seems to me, as an humble observer, that it would be their duty to make such an intervention. But, in cool perspective, they reach the conclusion that no compensating gain to the American people will result from reassuring European and world responsibilities, they would be failing in their duty if they embraced an unnecessary responsibility."

To most this would seem but hard common sense. But hard common sense may be woefully wrong at times. Hard common sense says, "save your life," but long ago it was stated on the highest authority that "whosoever would save his life shall lose it." There are higher motives than that of self interest, and experience shows that when these higher motives are allowed to rule and self interest sacrificed to them, the end proves that those who thus sacrificed their self interest in reality gained it.

For the underlying principle of the whole universe is sacrifice, and this affects its whole development. There is no genuine advance without sacrifice. In the natural sphere the higher species have been developed through sacrifice of the lower, a progress upwards through death. And this is true throughout, and most markedly in man and his development morally and spiritually.

It is the sustaining principle of family life, and where it is wanting the family breaks up. Many have found who began life in poverty and acquired wealth, that it brought them luxury and not happiness, for as soon as self denial was not practiced, disintegration of the home and family set in.

The honorable man is confronted sometimes with the temptation to repudiate his obligations because of self interest. But if he does he will find that he has lost out. When the state of Illinois was debating whether it should follow the example of other states and repudiate its debts, Stephen A. Douglass rose from his sick bed, and was carried to the legislature, and made this motion: "Resolved that the state of Illinois will be honest, even if it can never pay a cent." The result was that the credit of the state was established, money flowed in and a phenomenal financial prosperity ensued which enabled it to pay its debts.

In the late war, if Belgium had been actuated by self interest,

cal, volley ball, concerts, indoor baseball and campfire community singing."—Molalla Pioneer.

And it is also symptomatic of one thing which is the matter with the country. When people have to be bribed to work and keep on the job, it shows a decadence in moral fiber which is ominous. And it is also the best way to encourage oriental immigration, for if American help won't work, the farmers will be forced to take the Jap or Chinaman who will.

Germany probably would have won. But Belgium would have found that she had sacrificed for momentary gain all that made life worth while. She would have become bound hand and foot in a gilded slavery. But she chose the better part, counted not her safety precious, but nobly sacrificed it, and by that sacrifice entered into a fuller and more abundant national life.

And it is true of our own nation, it has been developed thru sacrifice. Self interest would have prompted the revolutionary fathers not to oppose the British government to the bitter end. But they did and their sacrifice proved to be the birth of the nation. And in the world war, what has increased our national prestige and influence, is not the dollars contributed, but the blood we have shed. It is this blood of lives sacrificed and laid down, which in later years will prove to be the seed of a glorious and abundant harvest.

Lord Birkenhead may scout idealism which has a wider vision than that of mere self interest, and advise against it, judging everything from the standpoint of present material gain, yet it will remain true, that "a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth."

The main question is not what is self, but humanity's interest! That is the duty of the hour.

STATE MARKET AGENT DEPARTMENT

Many requests come to the market agent for information regarding the new potato grading and inspection law, and there appears to be a general mistaken impression that all potatoes in lots of more than 50 pounds must be state inspected.

The law, which will go into effect September 15, is primarily for large shipments. It provides that in carlot shipments, or in quantities of ten tons or more, the potatoes shall be inspected by the state inspection department, according to the U. S. standard grades. There are four established grades, but grade No. 1 will take care of the most of the potatoes grown in Oregon.

On smaller shipments, from 50 pounds to 10 tons, state inspection is NOT required, unless requested by the buyer or seller, but the seller is required to grade the potatoes when sold and on the sack or container put the name and address of the grower and the grade. If this is not complied with they shall be labeled as "culls".

The state market agent will soon have ready for distribution for those who care for the information, a pamphlet giving the grades, fees for inspection and rules and regulations by the market master.

Some weeks ago the market agent cautioned dealers not to place too much credit on the newspaper reports that there was a large over-production of wheat in this country. Government reports now give out the figures that the production this year is short 69,000,000 over last year and 42,000,000 bushels short of the five-year record production, yet the market price is generally below the cost of production.

Farm Pointers The law providing that only pureblood registered dairy bulls may be sold, bought, or offered for public use until licensed by the dairy bull registration board was amended by the last legislature to place the penalty for violation on the receiver as well as the purveyor. The purpose of the law is to raise the standard of dairy cattle in Oregon. Cover crops for prunes are best drilled in at good depth in the latter part of August or the first part of September on ground that has been put into good friable condition following the last cultivation of summer. The seed may not germinate till the first fall rains, but if it is well rooted it will not dry out after it has started.—O. A. C.

nity organizations are coming into formation all over the state and many others are being agitated. The market department urges the most careful consideration with these local organizations, as on their success depends perhaps state-wide associations later on, and on their failure the set-back of the movement for a long time. Of utmost importance are economical administration and competent management. Expenses must be held to the lowest possible point until the association grows and gains in strength, and there must be men at the head who are capable of working out a sales agency that will get the products to the final consumers at the lowest possible retail price.

There must be free buying and normal consumption in order to create demand, and all possible unnecessary middle expenses must be eliminated if the grower is to get a living profit and the consumer a price that he will pay.

Clackamas county potato growers have a cooperative association well under way and are now signing up acreage. Washington and Yamhill counties are agitating the matter of following suit and as the other counties organize, they will doubtless merge under one selling agency. Some of the leaders foresee a state-wide organization.
