## OREGON NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

The operation of driving a 600-foot drift from a new shaft on a 200-foot level and unwatering the old works in the Millionaire mine, three miles out from Gold Hill, has been completed. The new drift is on a 5-foot vein of rich milling ore.

The state board of control has awarded the contract for the construction and equipment of a new heating plant at the state home for the feeble-minded at Salem to Tranchetti & Paretius of Portland. The bid was in the amount of \$47,997.

Dan Casey, slayer of J. H. (Buck) Phillips, special agent for the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company, paid the penalty for his crime by being hanged in the execution chamber of the state penitentiary at Salem Friday.

There are a total of 1977 pupils enrolled in the high school of Clackamas county, or an increase of 139 over the previous year, according to a report filed with the state superintendent of public instruction. The enrollment in the grades was 7420.

Resumption of the hearing involving rates on hay and grain and other farm products has been set by the public service commission for September 17 in Portland. This hearing was started some time ago, but was continued at the request of certain California corporations.

The second annual session of the Western Planning Mill and Woodworking association was held in Portland. Representatives from Nevada, Montana, New Mexico, Washington, California, British Columbia, Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Arizona, Colorado and Oregon were in attendance.

The Oregon public service commission issued an order protesting against the tentative valuations placed on the properties of the Sumpter Valley Railroad company by the Interstate Commerce commission. The public service commission contends that the valuations are too high and should be reduced.

A hearing on a petition for the cancellation of the rule for constructing combination rates on forest products from the North Pacific coast to eastern destinations will be held at the Multnomah county courtroom at Portland September 24, by Examiner Markley of the interstate commerce commission.

The value of the 1923 fish pack of the Columbia river is \$6,075,590, at wholesale prices. The number of full cases of the canned products is 309,000, and there are 1165 tiers of mild-cured, weighing 800 pounds each. The season ended at noon Saturday. The pack was only slightly better than that of 1922, which was a lean season.

The first portable fire engine to be established in the Cascade forests soon will be put in use by the Louie Hill timber interests in the Santiam forests. The engine is a gasoline motor and can be carried on one horse, and the hose equipment on another, and can be taken anywhere a pack horse with an ordinary load can travel.

A standard basis for grading cream was fixed at a conference in Portland of creamery men called by C. L. Hawley, state dairy and food commissioner. The following qualifications for top price cream were set: Delivery at least twice a week; not less than 30 per cent butterfat; not more than five-tenths of 1 per cent acidity, and a clean flavor and odor.
