Notice of School Election to Increase Tax More Than Six Per Cent Over That of the Previous Year.

NOTICE is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 108 of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, that an election will be held in said District at High School on the 18th day of December, 1923, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the tax levy in said District for the school year 1924-25 by more than six per cent over the amount of such levy for the year immediately preceding.

It is necessary to raise this additional mount by special levy for the following reasons:

Material, supplies and labor are approximately 25% higher than hereto-fore; the state department has recommended an additional teacher in the High School in order to standardize the school, and the district faces a deficit for the present school year of approximately \$2657.00.
