



OBITUARY

Mrs. Christina Boyd Hamilton who died at her home in Viola, Monday, November 19, 1923, at the age of 75 years, 2 months, 10 days, was born in Campbelltown, Argyleshire, Scotland, on Sept. 9 1843. She was married to John Hamilton at Auchingiech near Glasgow, on July 3, 1873, their golden wedding being celebrated last July.

With her family she came to America in June 1892, locating at Viola where she lived 31 years. The surviving relatives are her husband, John Hamilton and her sons, John R. and James, all of Viola, her daughters, Mrs. G. E. Dubois of Medford, Or., Mrs. C. Stone of Palo Alto, Calif., and Mrs. Charles Dubois of Estacada. Besides these there are thirteen grandchildren.

Another daughter, Mrs. Homer Dubois, died several years ago, and a son Robert died in Scotland. Four brothers also survive her, John Boyd of Aberdeen, Scotland, Robert Boyd of Illinois, George Boyd of South Africa and Martin Boyd of Manchester, England.

COMMUNICATION

To the Estacada members, Oregon Growers Cooperative Association:

The local receiving station at Estacada was closed for the 1923 season on November 10th. A final report on the season's operations is herewith rendered.

The plant was purchased by action of the board of directors during the summer and is now the property of the Oregon Growers Packing Corporation. J. G. Hayman was retained as local manager, and handled the plant both efficiently and economically.

The following tonnage of fruits was handled:

- Black caps, 9955lbs
- Currants..... 310lbs
- Gooseberries... 1973lbs
- Loganberries... 74660lbs
- Red Raspberries 8211lbs
- Strawberries... 23946lbs
- Dewberries.... 1343lbs
- Dried prunes... 306,614lbs

Total quantity fruit handled..... 427,012lbs, or 213.6 tons.

The plant was open from June 4 until the season was over, when the plant was closed to again open October 15th. It was finally closed on November 10, making a total of 16 weeks, at an actual cost of \$2.25 per ton. The light tonnage of early berries caused a much higher plant cost than otherwise would have been the case, as the plant could have handled three times the tonnage at the same total cost, thus reducing the per ton handling charge as shown by the fact that the prunes were handled at a cost of \$1.20 per ton against a total seasonal cost of \$2.25 per ton on all fruits, including prunes.

The berries were all sold to the Sterling Food Products Co., Portland, excepting the logans. Prices received were satisfactory but collections were exceedingly slow despite earnest attentions of this office. This has resulted in some misunderstandings among the local members.

The local committee is composed of A. W. Botkin, chairman, B. Schonburg, W. W. Tucker, John Osborne, and W. K. Corbin, with C. A. Jacques as director from the Estacada district. A meeting may be held on November 30th at which time Mr. Newhouse expects to discuss the fruit situation frankly.

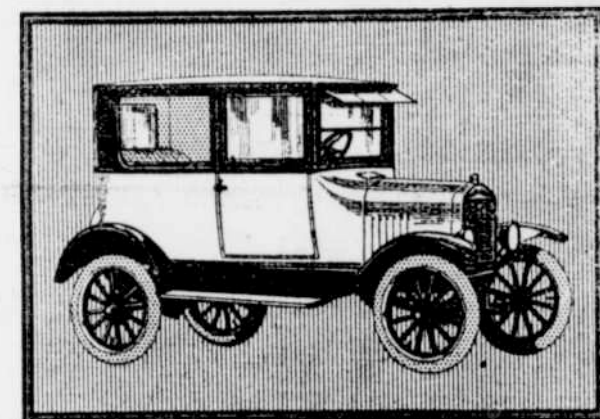
