POPE AND KING
Some comment has been made on the ceremonial homage paid by the king of Spain, to the Pope, on his recent visit to the Vatican. It is said that King Alfonso and his consort bent thrice the knee before Pope Pius and then kneeling kissed the latter's toe. This is not quite correct, for what the king kissed was an emperored cross on the tip of the papal slipper. This ceremony does not appeal to Americans, and to most protestants savors of sycophancy. But it must be remembered that Alfonso is a spiritual subject of the pope, who is to him the supreme earthly representative of Jesus Christ, and so the homage paid to the pope was in reality homage to Jesus Christ, and not to the pope as an individual. In monarchical countries when a king sends a personal representative, the latter is treated as if he were actually the king. The Viceroy of India is accorded royal honors on state occasions, as representing the King-Emperor George V. These may seem fine distinctions but they exist nevertheless, and make a great deal of difference.

But the thought arises if former President Wilson had been a Roman Catholic and when in Rome had visited the pope, and had tendered him the homage as did the king of Spain, what a howl would have been raised over here, if ever a Roman Catholic becomes president, it will never do for him while in office to visit Italy, for if he did, he would have to visit the king of Italy, and as a Roman Catholic he could not slight his spiritual chief, by not visiting him also. And if he did, truly he would be on the horns of a dilemma.

CHRISTMAS SEALS
The Oregon Tuberculosis association has started its annual sale of Christmas seals, the proceeds of which are to help the association fight the white plague. The response should be a hearty and generous one, for the battle has been remarkably successful. In 1908 the death rate from tuberculosis was 200 in every 100,000 persons, and this year it has fallen to 97 for the same number. If the association receives sufficient financial support, it is hoped the rate will be decreased to 50 in 100,000 by 1930. These seals carry hope to sufferers, and probably in no other way will a small sum of money do more good. Buy seals.

The recall of the Governor Pierce is not shelved. The Oregonian, Sunday, reported that the petitions contained over 80,000 signatures, and those working it are only waiting the psychological moment to file them. THE DEADLY AUTO
Deaths from automobile accidents during 1922 in the census registration area of the U. S., which contains 85 percent of the total population, numbered 11,666, an increase of 1498 over the previous year. The Portland area showed a slight decrease but Oregon as a whole had more accidents. But this will have no effect on the demand for the latest models.

J. D. Mickle has been appointed by Governor Pierce to succeed the late C. L. Hawley as state dairy and food commissioner. This was done as it was the dying request of Mr. Hawley. Mr. Mickle formerly served two terms in this position, so he is well acquainted with its duties. Governor Pierce in making the appointment, intimated he might have done so in any case. The new commissioner is a republican in politics.

The sixty-eighth congress opened Monday to a rough house. The insurgent element was to the fore and prevented its organization. President Coolidge had intended reading his message that day, but on account of the house not being organized, he could not.

Farmers Take Notice
The warehouse law of Oregon requires every warehouse taking in grain to be bonded and to operate under a license obtained under the Grain Inspection Department. The bond is required in order to safeguard farmers storing their grain. The license is merely a receipt that bond has been furnished and to show to the public that the warehouse is operating according to law.

It would not only be the act of a good citizen, but really his duty, for anyone to report to the state market agent any irregularity of the warehouse business. If there is a warehouse in the state of Oregon receiving grain from farmers and operating without a license, those farmers storing grain in such warehouse have no protection for loss or theft.

These warehouses are licensed from the Grain Inspection Department and delinquencies should be reported to the state market agent, 723 Court house, Portland, as such report might be the means of saving himself or neighbor from heavy loss.—State Market Agt. Dept.
