Instead of warm June.

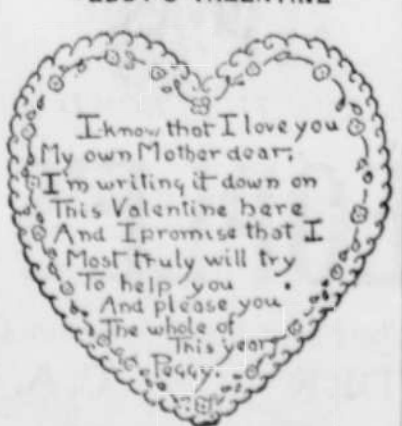
'So I'll mix 'em and change 'em
