Home Pointers

Baked custards will not curdle if they are put in a pan of water to bake. The water should not be allowed to boil.

In making meringues, use 3 tablespoons of sugar to one egg white. Place in a moderate oven that will take it about 15 minutes to brown and you will have a meringue that will keep its shape.

If soft custards curdle, beat with a Dover egg beater till they are smooth.

Oranges are better than milk for the mid-morning lunch. They are high in vitamine content, and do not deaden the appetite as milk does.

Fruit preserves may be made with far less sugar if salt is used. They must be kept a few days before using, so that the salty taste is no longer distinguishable. Allow 1/4 cup of sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt to each pound of fruit. O. A. C. Home Economics Dept.

O. A. C. Farm Reminders

Barnyard manure applied now to the home orchard or garden soil will be of greater benefit than if applied later. Manuring may be done at this time if the ground is not so wet as to cause it later to bake or harden due to the hauling over it. Well rotted manure is preferred to fresh.

One of the quickest ways to kill young chicks is by feeding them moldy grain. Do not try to save a few cents by feeding some of the grain that was left over from last year and allowed to become moldy. Examine it carefully and if there is any doubt don't use it.

Get the chicks out on the ground as soon as possible. Do not make hot house chicks of them.
