## The Egg and Its Care

The egg is one of our best foods if properly cared for. The price is as the farmer and poultryman make it. Old or held, dirty, small and cracked eggs are the main causes for most low prices. Eggs should be gathered at least twice, and it is best to gather them four times daily. The nests should never be allowed to get or to remain dirty. Change the nest material often or whenever it gets dirty.

If eggs get soiled, clean them with a dry or damp cloth if necessary, and when gathering keep them separated so when marketed they are not all mixed up, white, soiled, brown and little ones, together. Don't ever take a doubtful egg to market. Remember the market is what you make it.

## MANY CANDIDATES FILE FOR OFFICES

The candidates who are filing their names for various political offices in this county, are said to be more numerous than ever before. So the political pot promises to boil merrily as election draws near.

M. J. Lee, Phil Hammond, M. S. Shrock, Geo. Randall and Edward Shearer are out for representative to the state legislature. All are republicans. For sheriff, W. J. Wilson, the present incumbent, seeks renomination on the republican ticket; opposed to him are Simon MacDonald, a world war veteran, W. B. May, former chief of the police in Oregon City. The democratic candidates are W. F. Strack of Sandy, and E. T. Mass, who was sheriff 1911-1914 and ran sheriff Wilson a close race at the last election.

County commissioner's office is sought by E. D. Olds, Oak Grove; Geo. T. Parry, Milwaukie; J. J. Hattan, Carver; Ward Lawton, Mt. Pleasant and Richard Wright, Canby, all republicans.

For county school superintendent, Mrs. Agnes Buckley, Oswego; Robert Ginther, Oregon City and Brenton Vedder, Gladstone, are in the running.

O. A. Pace and Ed. L. Johnson are out for the coronership.
