Baby Clinic

A baby clinic was held at the Estacada hotel last Monday, by the Clackamas county health association. Dr. Briscoe, of Oregon City, health officer and Dr. Estella Ford Warner of the Child Welfare Bureau of Portland, were the examining physicians, assisted by Miss Pearson county health nurse and two ladies from Portland. The following local ladies also assisted: Miss Anna Dillon, Mrs. Gerald Wilcox, Mrs. Theo. Ahlberg, Mrs. Raymond Lovelace and Mrs. W. J. Moore. There were 39 babies examined.

A meeting of the local health group will be announced soon and anyone interested will be welcome.

Masonic Block Planned

The local Masons are planning to erect a structure which will be a noteworthy improvement to the town. Provided they can make the necessary financial arrangements they will secure the lots in the burnt area owned by R. G. Marchbank and A. E. Sparks, which make a total frontage of 75 feet. On these they will put up a 2 story hollow tile, fireproof building. On the ground floor will be three store rooms and entrance hall. Two of these will be occupied by Bob Marchbanks' confectionery and pool room, while the third may be subdivided into offices and barber shop. The lodge rooms will be on the second story, and at the rear end of the lots, will be a picture theatre thirty-five feet deep and going across the full length of the three lots. The structure is estimated to cost about \$19,000. When this is completed and the pharmacy, there will be only one lot vacant left in the burnt block.

Baker Made Good Impression

Hon. George L. Baker, mayor of Portland, and candidate for nomination on the republican ticket, as U. S. senator spoke to a rather slim audience in the high school auditorium last Thursday night. Before his address the film, "Home, Sweet Home," was shown, in which the late President Harding appeared.

Mayor Baker was introduced by his brother mayor, H. C. Stephens of Estacada. He discussed the issues of his campaign and stressed the importance of united action by all Oregon people for the upbuilding of the state and the development of its vast natural resources. He said that Oregon would have enough electric power to supply five states. Another industry he warmly advocated developing was flax, and urged also the erection of woolen mills to manufacture flannels and cloth from Oregon wool, instead of shipping it to Boston. He made a favorable impression and did not criticize his competitors, saying he did not believe in mudslinging, and if he was elected he would go to Washington, but if not, the other fellow would.
