**Estacada Boy Scouts**

Estacada now has a good live bunch of real Boy Scouts. Troop meetings are held each week in their club rooms at the Methodist Episcopal church with Scout Master H. W. Mort, and Assistant Scout Master S. K. Ostergaard in charge. All meetings are held in strict accordance with headquarter requirements and the troop is officially recognized and registered at national headquarters in New York.

A few weeks ago the boys took their first hike and cooked their first official meal in the open without the use of any cooking utensils, including raw meat and potatoes, which is one of the required Second Class tests.

There are three patrols in the troop—two grammar school and one high school.

Scoutmaster Mort in company with J. K. Ely, a member of the troop committee, attended a county scoutmaster's banquet at Oregon City last week at which time it was decided to establish a summer scout camp for all scouts in this county. The site has not as yet been selected, but it will doubtless be established in close proximity to Estacada. This camp will be supervised by a paid scout executive and a number of assistants, and all county troops can go there and spend from one to four weeks. The regular scout program will be in force, a paid cook will be in attendance, and "grub" will be trucked in daily to feed an estimated group of about 75 boys a week. This will be one of the great experiences of the boy's life.

At the same meeting it was also announced that the scouts would have charge of certain duties in connection with the Gladstone Chautauqua this year. A limited number will be chosen from each troop whose entire expenses will be paid by the Chautauqua committee for the fourteen day period. There is considerable suspense among members of the local troop as to who will be most worthy of this honor and treat.

Forest Ranger Carter has also promised the local troop his assistance in arranging for a trip up the river this summer to see the great project of the Portland Electric Power Co. You will no doubt hear more of the scouts before the summer is past.

**American Legion News**

A leap from the fortieth place to the fifth in percentage of members was made by the Oregon Department of the American Legion during the first five months of 1924. This department is now "over the top," having a total enrollment greater than that for the entire of 1923. More than 50 per cent of the posts in Oregon have reached or exceeded their membership for a year ago. Six posts have two members for every one they had last year and some posts have tripled their membership.

A certificate of merit, handsomely engraved, will be given by the State Department to all posts showing increase in membership over that of last year, at the State Convention to be held in Portland this June.

**Farm Reminders.**

In Oregon the pruning of black raspberries in late May keeps the plants from becoming top-heavy and bending badly. No trellising is necessary. The experiment station finds that the canes can be kept from spreading by tying loosely into bundles with hemp or bag twine.

Mineral is part of the hog's ration essential to proper development of the animal, says H. A. Lingren of the Oregon station. Many satisfactory mineral mixtures may be used. The following is one that can be mixed at home: Charcoal, 75 pounds, raw rock phosphate 3 pounds, pulverized copperas 1 pound, salt 6 lbs, glauber salts 6 pounds and flowers of sulphur 3 pounds.

**School to Teach Kindness**

Oregon was the first state to make teaching of kindness to animals compulsory in the public schools, from fifteen minutes to half an hour each week in the school year, by all public school teachers. A new course of study has been prepared for each of the eight grades, with supplementary reading and story telling on important points for children in the general program of human education and care of animals.

The new course of study will be printed and got out in time for the opening of school all over the state this fall. The Oregon law is much sought after by other states.

**Oregon's Famous Dog "Bobbie"**

A collie dog of Silverton, Oregon, who having lost his master in Indiana, and when his master had given up all hopes of ever seeing him again, returned on foot to the old home, foot sore and weary, having traveled 3000 miles across seven states in winter.

Mr. Brazier, the owner of the dog, has had many offers from moving picture concerns to film Bobbie's trip across the continent. The Columbia Feature Film Syndicate of Portland, was organized to make a three-reel picture which will depict adventures in the life of a dog who has lost his master, is friendless, foot-sore and unhappy, with his home one thousand leagues toward the sunset. Millions will be permitted to see Bobbie, who will appear "in person" with the picture in all larger cities.
