Gives U. of O. \$30,000.00

A gift of \$30,000 from P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon, and family, brings the total subscription to the alumni fund of the University Gift Campaign to \$312,232. The president's gift was made in the names of Mr. and Mrs. Campbell, Mrs. E. A. Hassen and Walter Church of Berkeley, California.

Graduates and former students are giving liberally to the fund which is to be used for sorely needed buildings, particularly a new library building, on the campus at Eugene.

One graduate in Portland, a man who came to Eugene as a student with a total capital of fifty cents, worked his way thru the university and later worked his way thru Columbia University law school in New York City, gave \$3500 to the fund. He said he estimated his education cost the university \$1200, and he wanted to pay it back with heavy interest.
