Residence lots in business section \$75 each; lots above bench line not facing on Broadway or Main streets, corners \$75, intermediate, \$50.

The following restrictions were made: Livery barns, lumber yards, carpenter shops, wagon shops and blacksmith shops, were not allowed on either Broadway or Main streets. All of Block 5 and the west half of Block 6 had been set aside for the above enterprises.
