Dr. Armentrow of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Hester of Salem, instructress. There are probably thirty or thirty-five young people besides the staff of teachers. The afternoons will be devoted to games and recreation. The conference hopes to accomplish much work in the Lord's service. The convention opened Monday, July 7, and will close next Monday, July 14.

America's Lumber Industry

American lumber industry in 1923:

1. Cut enough lumber to comfortably house 10,000,000 persons.
2. Cut enough lumber to rebuild three times the 800,000 destroyed buildings of the French.
3. Cut enough lumber to encircle the world three times with a foot-wide duckboard walk.
4. Felled trees on 5,000,000 acres of land.
5. Employed more than 800,000 woodsmen and millmen.
6. Required 3,000,000 carloads for hauling.

But what steps are taken to replace the trees which have thus been turned into lumber? How about reforestation? In Europe this is made compulsory, and so there is a constant new growth taking the place of that cut down. It won't be long if cutting goes on at the rate it has the last few years, before all the timber will have been felled, except on those areas which constitute the government reservations.
