COUNTY FAIR NOTES

Clackamas County Fair will be held at Canby, September 17, 18, 19 and 20.

Detailed plans for the county fair were considered by fourteen of the twenty-five members of the executive committee at a meeting held last week, H. W. Kanne, presiding.

Enthusiasm was at a high pitch when Carl Joehnke outlined some of the things definitely decided upon in connection with the four days' meet. In addition to the Jerseys, Guernseys and Holstein cattle, the herd of Ayrshires owned by the Earlcrest Farm of Eagle Creek will be exhibited. In the line of concessions a merry-go-round and Ferris wheel have been secured. The baseball tournament will include games between the teams of the Crown-Willamette company, Carus and Monitor.

Negotiations are pending with Everette Wilson, who put on a round-up or rodeo show at the fair grounds July 4 and 5, to put on another show during the four days of the fair. In addition to the other attractions, Wilson has offered to bring 20 Umatilla Indians.

Friday, September 29, was designated as school or children's day. Brenton Vedder, county school superintendent, will send a communication to each district urging that the schools be dismissed for that day and that the attendance at the fair be universal.

Other features will include a speaker at the forum hour each morning, address to be on some topic of special interest to the farmers. Dancing at the pavilion erected last year will be a feature each evening. Conceding that horse racing would be a drawing card, the committee decided that the expense would make it prohibitive. A. E. Cowell suggested a dog and cat show as attractive features. While too late to be taken up this year, the matter will be taken up in time for the 1925 fair.

Masonic Temple Dedication

The laying of the Corner Stone and the dedication of the Masonic Temple will be held on the afternoon and evening of Thursday, September 4th. The ceremonies of the laying of the Corner Stone are at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon and the dedication at 7:30 in the evening. under the direction of Grand Master Oliver P. Coshaw, Justice of the Supreme Court of Oregon, assisted by the officers of the Grand Lodge of Oregon. An elaborate program is being prepared for the evening which will be announced next week.
