

GET BEHIND IT

The question of holding the annual show of the Pacific International Live Stock Show this year has been definitely settled. It will be held in a new, better and bigger building. The contracts have been let. Work has started. Contractors guarantee to turn over the building ready for occupancy on or about October 25th.

The new building will be more commodious than the old. New features will be added. There will be a boys' and girls' club building. The horse show arena will be enlarged and the seating capacity increased substantially. Changed conditions make it possible to erect a larger, better building now at less cost than the original home of the Pacific International was built.

It is gratifying that the decision of the board of directors to rebuild was unanimous. Surely it was the only decision possible under the circumstances. It was unthinkable that an institution of such far reaching significance to the Northwest in general and the live stock industry in particular should be permitted to die; and that being so it would have been a tactical error to have passed up this year's show. The officers and management of the Pacific International are to be commended for their good judgment in losing no time.

The announcement of the rebuilding should be the signal for enthusiastic, united and loyal support of the livestock industry of the Northwest. We have no doubt that this will be forthcoming; in fact already there has been ample evidence of it.
