Queen for County Fair

A Queen who will rule over the Clackamas county fair at Canby will be selected by a contest which opened September 1st and will continue until September 12th. There will be seven entries in the contest from as many organizations of the county.

The Farm Bureau; Clackamas County Grange; Clackamas Bankers association; North of Clackamas river, Milwaukie, Estacada and Sandy; west of Willamette river, West Linn, Oswego and Wilsonville; Oregon City; South of Clackamas river, Oregon City excepted and includes Canby, Molalla and Oak Lawn, are expected to put a queen candidate in the field.

M. D. Latourette, who has conducted the past highway queen contest and other like competitions is chairman of the executive board of the fair queen contest.

Clackamas County Bankers association, J. R. Humphreys, Oregon City; H. B. Evans, Canby; Dwight Seeley, Wilsonville.

The successful girl candidate will be accorded a ceremonious coronation ceremony and will rule over all the four days of fair celebration at Canby, September 17, 18, 19 and 20.

The fair officials are already gathering exhibits from every section of the county in an attempt to make the four days this year the largest and best in the history of Clackamas county. Several new and added features have already been announced which bid well for a fulfillment of their plans.
