**A Trip to Mt. Hood**

Saturday, August 30th, W. P. Ferrell of Barton, H. B. Sarver of Upper Garfield, H. G. Paxton and C. A. Looney, of Currinsville decided it was a very good time to take a good look at Mt. Hood. They camped near the government camp over night and as sight seers were coming in all night and the guide with a party of climbers left the camp at 1:30 a. m., and another party left at 4:00 a. m., there was no time to snooze, so they left camp at 5:09 a. m. and walked the four miles to the edge of the timber line, and as the top seemed to be near a possible picnic was in store.

But oh! We kept going and going up the mountain side, which is one of the most picturesque I have ever seen, with its ice glaciers. We crossed over crevices that seemed to be 100 to 150 feet deep, and at one place we had to climb by rope 1500 feet over the ice and snow gorge, one place being two feet, we could cross over and by swinging to the rope we could go over a gorge four feet wide and no telling how deep. But before ascending a great distance one of our party, H. B. Sarver, who is 78 years of age, a civil war veteran, as well as an Oregon pioneer, gave out and we stumbled along, leaving him to wait our return.

It was eleven o'clock by the time we landed at the top, and from the sulphur fumes that sickened us for a while, we would judge that St. Peter would have none of us and had started us on the down grade, but we knew we had climbed, so as there was so much smoke we thought we would test it out if there was any heat, and there was enough to burn our fingers.

We spent one and one-half hours on the top and the view seen of the surrounding country from the summit is well worth the effort made in climbing this lofty peak.

A number besides ourselves climbed, but on our return trip which took us three and one-half hours to descend, we saw crowds who had given out and were sound asleep while waiting, and there were others, children especially, who were exhausted and being taken back to camp.

After seeing the Mt. Hood Loop and the road that has been built, there seems to be no question that a road can be built anywhere.
