The guitar club composed of Mrs. J. E. Gates, Irma Gates, Ruth Day, and Avis Cadonau, played one number between the addresses. The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. U. H. Gibbs. A social time followed and light refreshments were served. The large gathering testified to the esteem to which the departing pastor and his wife are generally held.

**Resolutions by County W. C. T. U.**

The Clackamas County convention of the W. C. T. U. which met Wednesday of last week in the M. E. church at Estacada passed a number of resolutions: Growing disregard for the Bible and general use of the Sabbath as a day of pleasure instead of worship were censured.

The resolution declared that poor moral conditions in the schools was largely due to neglect of parents to train their children along proper lines, and urged that all professing Christians maintain family worship. Women were urged to vote that officials pledged to law enforcement might be elected.

The attitude of Governor Pierce on law enforcement, particularly in regard to the dry law was indorsed.

Other resolutions were adopted pledging members to fight against the inveterate use of cigarettes and narcotics; indorsing the children's Farm Home at Corvallis, and pledging moral and financial support to that institution.

In the election of officers Mrs. E. E. Andrews of Oregon City was re-elected county president; Mrs. E. E. Hannah of Estacada, vice-president; Mrs. George Eberly of Oregon City, corresponding and recording secretary; Mrs. Fannie Smith of Jennings Lodge, treasurer.

A thank offering amounted to \$9.75, and the unions of Clackamas county pledged \$41 for county work.
