CITY COUNCIL HOLDS REGULAR MEETING

The city council held its regu-
lar business meeting in the City
hall Tuesday evening with all
members present.

The general business of the city
was taken up and all bills pre-
sented ordered paid. Several
matters of importance were dis-
cussed, such as lights on the
bridge, the filing of the water-
rights on the contemplated water
shed and various minor improve-
ments needed in the city.

A committee of people resid-
ing along Pierce street were
present and asked for financial
aid in the graveling of that
street from the Christian church
north to the county road. The
council agreed to do all in their
power, realizing that this was
one of the main thoroughfares in
that part of Estacada.

A motion was made and car-
ried that the city discontinue
paying a night marshal until an
amendment could be submitted
to the voters at the November
election for their approval of the
levying of a tax for this purpose.

The proposition of levying a
tax sufficient to raise \$100 per
month, that \$50 per month be
taken from the water fund and
that the business men be asked
to contribute \$50 per month met
with the favor of the council.
This way it would be possible to
employ a day and a night watch-
man, thus giving the city added
protection at all times. A com-
mittee was appointed to draft
such an amendment.

Geo. Kitching and Ed. Stein-
man were granted a permit to
put in a culvert in front of the
lot located on the corner of Main
street and the county road. This
location is to be used as a new
filling station. The council
agreed to lay a four inch water
main in the alley between Main
street and Broadway, to within
one block of the city limits. The
remainder of the pipe will be
laid by the parties who desire
city water on their premises.

Equalization Board Through

The members of the county
board of equalization have com-
pleted their work after being in
session since September 22.
More than 320 firms responded to
the request to appear and show
cause why their assessments
should not be raised. This call
included merchants bankers and
manufacturers. Less than a
dozen firms failed to appear,
thus showing that a splendid
spirit of co-operation exists.

After a careful study of the
rolls a decision was reached to
fix the assessment at 35 per cent
of the inventory value of March
first.

The result is that in most cases
the assessed valuation of prop-
erty will be materially increased.
Should those who failed to ap-
pear or any of those affected,
desire to appeal from the amount
fixed by the equalization board,
it will be necessary to appeal to
the District court for relief.

Republicans Will Hold Rally

Hon. Thomas B. Kay of Salem,
former state treasurer for eight
years, and a candidate for the
same office at the November
election, will address the voters
of Estacada and vicinity on the
evening of October 17, at the
Gem theatre on Main street.

Mr. Kay is an expert on taxa-
tion matters, is an interesting
speaker and his address will be
well worth hearing. It is ex-
pected other speakers will take
part. Everyone is invited to at-
tend.
